They make sure no one goes hungry, children are cared for in the hardest of times and that vulnerable members of our community get the support they need. We also applaud the many charities who have stepped up to support Canberrans impacted by the housing crisis.

Chief Minister's Charitable Fund

The Chief Minister's Charitable Fund (CMCF) is administered by Hands Across Canberra. Since its inception in 2018, the CMCF has supported more than 203 projects with over \$2.36m and has leveraged more than \$5.3m in additional funds for community projects.

Responding to emerging needs throughout the Canberra region, in 2022–23, the Chief Minister's Charitable Fund joined with HAC supporters and 114 charities to run a successful Canberra Day Appeal, which generated more than \$850,000 in much-needed funds for the community sector

The CMCF, alongside community foundations, administered 1 collective grant round valued at over \$1.4 million, which supported 58 projects covering a wide range of sectors and addressing critical social issues. (Of these, 21 were directly funded by the CMCF)

From the CMCF, \$356,000 was granted to the community sector to are experiencing with mental health, education and employment, housing and belonging.

M Giving and granting

OVER \$2.3M was raised during the year, and the amount in the Perpetual Fund1 grew from \$670k to \$1.2m. The Perpetual Fund included the establishment of our first seed-funding account²

Hands Across Canberra distributed \$1.9M to charities. That means, together with the Canberra Foundations Collaborative OVER **\$3M** were mobilised in support of local causes

We ran 3 FUNDING ROUNDS in partnership with the Chief Minister's Charitable Fund, Aspen Medical, A+P Leemhuis, and the Canberra Foundations Collaborative (John James Foundation and the Snow Foundation) which distributed more than \$1.75m into the community sector and supported a total of 106 PROJECTS

We ran a **RELIEF AND CAPITAL UPGRADES** grant round, which attracted many applications. We are grateful to our major donor, Asset Construction Pty Ltd, for coming to the table and supporting this grant round and 47 PROJECTS this year

Together with partners in community and government, and in honour of the late Sue Salthouse the Sue Salthouse Leadership Fund supported its first THREESCHOLARS with the aim of building the leadership capabilities of people with disability



Granting insights

With RISING INFLATION AND COSTS, organisations are finding it hard to cover relief and capital upgrades

The **COMMUNITY SECTOR IS SEEKING SUSTAINABILITY** and this year we gave the largest number of multi-year grants we have ever committed

The number of grant applications decreased but the **AMOUNT REQUESTED HAS** INCREASED.

In particular, requests have doubled in the areas of Mental Health and WELLBEING; **DISABILITY; AND BELONGING** - either in amount or number of projects - and made up our largest areas of giving this year

- A fund that is invested to provide long-term support for the community in perpetuity
- A type of donor-advised fund that allows people to start on a journey towards structured giving with minimal investment.
