With your help, Hands Across Canberra experienced another year of strong growth. We reached \$5.3+ million in assets and passed \$6 million in grants since inception, both proud milestones.

Raising awareness and cultivating empathy in our city

- Our Canberra Philanthropy Award was presented to the late <u>Terry Snow AM</u>, marking his remarkable legacy to Canberra and the region.
- The Canberra Day Appeal reached <u>50%</u> <u>more people</u> with many activations by our 81 campaign partner charities.
- Sporting teams and events are partnering with Hands Across Canberra to spread the message of give where you live: the Raiders, Brumbies, Owls and Cricket ACT helped us reach over <u>250,000 people</u> this year.

Giving and granting where we live and earn

→ \$1.5 MILLION

Over **\$1.5 million** was distributed to charities by Hands Across Canberra and the Chief Minister's Charitable Fund.

→ \$3.0 MILLION

Over \$3 million was raised during the year, and the Perpetual Fund grew from \$1.2 million to \$1.8 million.

→ \$500,000

Our most successful End of Financial Year (EOFY) campaign to date raised more than \$500,000 in donations for Canberra, testament to Hands Across Canberra's profile in the community.

→ \$1.5 MILLION

Our major grant round with the Canberra Foundations Collaborative distributed more than \$1.5m into the community sector for a third year in a row and supported a total of 63 projects.

> \$220,000

The Sue Salthouse Leadership Fund doubled to \$220,000 increasing capacity to support opportunities for people with disability to build their skills and experience, representation and leadership.

CHIEF MINISTER'S CHARITABLE **FUND**

The Chief Minister's Charitable Fund (CMCF) is administered by Hands Across Canberra. Since its inception in 2018, the CMCF has supported more than 231 projects with over \$2.69 million, leveraging more than \$6.47 million in additional funds for community projects.

Responding to emerging needs throughout the Canberra region, in 2023-24 the Chief Minister's Charitable Fund:

- → joined HAC supporters and 81 charities for the Canberra Day Appeal, raising \$750,000 for the community sector
- developed an Impact Measuring Tool with Canberra's community foundations; administered a collective grant round valued at over \$1.5 million and funded 28 projects through CMCF
- → granted \$330,000 to the community sector to address mental health, employment, housing and belonging challenges

WE ARE GROWING A VIBRANT COMMUNITY **OF CHANGEMAKERS**
